GrantWatch, a subscription software program, is also now available to assist organizations seeking grant opportunities. Our Resource Guide, featured in this report, is continuously updated and well utilized in the community.

Looking to the future, I am excited to announce that plans are underway to develop our Legacy Foundation Plaza. Over the next two years we will be constructing an Event Center and a Retreat Facility for our partners to use for educational gatherings and as a venue for fundraisers and other events.

### Who We Are

The Legacy Foundation promotes healthy communities through a focus on four priorities:

# **Philanthropy**

Philanthropy involves giving initiatives for the public good and focus on quality of life. In fulfilling its work as a private foundation, the Legacy Foundation's giving initiatives include donations through our Grant Cycles.

Strategic Grants: grants for specific initiatives the Legacy Foundation Board identifies. Strategic Assessment studies as well as information from existing public health data may be used to identify opportunities.

Innovative Grants: grants to support innovative ideas that support the mission of Promoting Population Health and Community Wellness.

Responsive Grants: grants in response to special requests or needs from the communities served.

Emergent Grants: grants for assistance with urgent or immediate community needs.

Fast Pitch Grants: education and technology grants to strengthen an organization's ability to operate efficiently.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Grants: grants for the purpose of obtaining Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) training for their staff, Board, and volunteers.

# **Capacity Building**

Community capacity building is the process of developing and strengthening the skills, instincts, abilities, processes and resources that organizations and communities need to survive, adapt, and thrive in the fast-changing world.

In fulfilling its Mission, the Legacy Foundation plays a significant role in supporting capacity-building efforts.

The Legacy Foundation offers grants designated to build organizational capacity through education and resource development. Additionally, the Legacy Foundation promotes capacity building by offering free monthly workshops for nonprofit organizations. Topics such as fundraising, board development, strategic planning, and media and marketing are examples of classes offered.

# **Event Center and Retreat Center Construction Begins**

On April 22, 2024, shovels were placed at-the-ready to break ground for the building of a new Event Center. Legacy Foundation Board of Directors and Sierra Vista Mayor Clea McCaa were invited to be the first to turn ground to celebrate the event.

The Event Center will feature a state-of-the-art conference space with seating for up to 150 people, the latest in technology including big screens and sound booth, a commercial kitchen, a welcoming lobby, covered outdoor seating and landscaped grounds.

The facility is designed to be used by nonprofit organizations as a venue for fundraising events, conference space, and meeting space.

A Retreat Center is also being developed on the campus. The Retreat Center will feature a relaxed vibe with comfortable seating promoting a more cozy, welcoming and comfortable meeting space. The Retreat Center can be used for less formal get-togethers but also for board retreats and other types of meetings. The Center features a state-of-the-art board room in addition to a meeting space that offers relaxation and comfort.



### **Cochise County Drug Summit**

The Legacy Foundation sponsored the first Cochise County Drug Summit on April 10th, 2024. The Summit was a gathering of Cochise County providers of services addressing substance use disorder, including prevention, treatment, peer support, outreach, and recovery.

There were several intended outcomes of the Summit.

- Networking organizations and increasing collaborative relationships
- Understanding the issues related to substance abuse as it pertains to Cochise County
- Addressing stigma through the story-telling of lived experiences
- Identifying gaps and opportunities in Cochise County communities
- Creating plans to take action to address gaps and opportunities

Keynote speaker was Sam Quinones, well-traveled journalist and researcher in the opioid epidemic and the substance abuse crisis in America. Several special guest speakers followed, all presenting Cochise County specific information, data, and reports. Several presentations by persons with lived-experience in addiction and recovery and a presentation by a family member of someone struggling with substance use disorder offered the attendees a deeper look into the struggles and challenges individuals and families face.

At the end of the day, table groups were formed and action items created. Each community in Cochise County was represented by at least one team with action items developed specific to that community. Discussion of progress on the action items occurs at the Cochise Addiction Recovery Partnership.



#### Achievements of the Summit include:

- Expanding membership and participation in the Cochise Addiction Recovery Partnership (CARP)
- Increased education about Fentanyl Facts in Arizona
- Increased collaboration between organizations
- Expanded medication assisted therapy (MAT) treatments in Benson
- Increased education and availability of Narcan
- Development of a video series, Stories of Hope, highlighting journeys of recovery from substance abuse

On November 18th, 2024, a follow-up to the Summit took place focused on providing information and education to the public.

Each grant cycle has its own budget and awards up to a maximum annual dollar amount. The Responsive Grant awards up to \$5,000. The Fast Pitch Grant awards up to \$2,500. The Innovative Grant awards up to \$50,000. The Strategic Grant awards vary from year to year. Discretionary Grants vary depending on the project. Sponsorships award up to \$1,000. The total amount awarded in FY24 for all grants and sponsorships is \$793,384





With funding requests often far exceeding the budgeted amount for each grant, the grant review committee makes very difficult decisions about what projects to fund and for how much. 

### **Fast Pitch Grants**

Bisbee Science Exploration & Research Center (BSERC): \$2,500 - Funds used to strategically adopt QuickBooks accounting software. This technological advancement strengthens BSERC's financial foundation and sustainability

Break the Cycle jam3s Inc. / Jennifer House: \$2,500 - Funds used to open a thrift shop inside its coffee shop and provide a point of sale system

City of Bisbee: \$2,500 - The Mantis X3 Training System along with Bluetooth technology will provide every officer within the agency the ability to complete Arizona Officers and Standards and Training (AZPOST) continuous training requirements

City of Tombstone: \$2,500 - Tombstone Marshal's Office has online required training which is required by Arizona Peace Officer and Standards Training (AZPOST). This program will provide the deputy and employees an off-the-sensitive law enforcement computers for training

Love Muziq Operation 13:2: \$2,332.93 - Funds used to purchase upgraded equipment for its youth recording studio. This equipment will be used by studio interns/staff to learn current systems & techniques in the audio engineering field & to better instruct our students

National Alliance on Mental Illness Southeastern Arizona (NAMI): \$2,500 - Implementation of QuickBooks Advanced with Payroll plus HR will improve organizational efficiency and provide for easier financial tracking and reporting

Patagonia Regional Times: \$2,500 - Funds used for the purchase of a camera and for photojournalism workshops to support the work of our 24 volunteer citizen journalists at the Patagonia Regional Times

SouthEastern Arizona Governments Organization (SEAGO): \$2,467 - Funds used to send three people to the 2024 Arizona Rural Policy Forum (RPF) to enrich SEAGO staff with new connections, programs, funding sources, education, and inspiration

Volunteer Interfaith Caregiver Program (VICaP): \$2,500 - VICaP used the funds towards professional development and additional training opportunities for our paid-staff members in order to learn and grow to best serve our Neighbors

### Cochise Harm Reduction

Cochise Harm Reduction completed the first year of a twoyear \$100,000 Innovative Grant for Cochise County Street Outreach. The project has increased access to Naloxone, decreased rates of infectious disease through distribution of sterile syringes, and increased access to care.

Cochise Chess received a Fast Pitch grant for \$2,500 to send its leadership team to the St. Louis Chess Conference. Its goal is to enhance teaching strategies and community engagement to elevate bilingual chess programs in rural areas of Cochise County.

A Fast Pitch grant in the amount of \$2,332 enabled Love Muziq Operation 13:2 to upgrade equipment for its youth recording studio. Used to instruct students in the audio engineering field, the equipment is used by interns and staff to learn current audio systems and techniques.

### Senior Citizens of Patagonia, Inc.

When told that its commercial kitchen needed to be upgraded to stainless steel, Senior Citizens of Patagonia applied for and received a \$4,500 Responsive grant to do the upgrade. The upgrade improves hygiene, sanitation, meal preparation efficiency and appearance for its 166 registered senior meal clients.
